Blessing to you All!

This month, as we celebrate the achievements of the BIPOC community (black, indigenous, people of colour) I want to remember the words of poet Amanda S Gorman. If you are unsure of who Amanda is – think back to President Biden's inauguration in January 2021.



When she was just 19 years old, Gorman was the first person to be named the National Youth Poet Laureate in 2017. In addition to recognizing the talents of a young generation, the National Youth Poet Laureate program attempts to create spaces for young people to participate in political and cultural conversations of their time. Gorman's writing focuses on issues of oppression, feminism, race, and marginalization. She wowed the world as the youngest ever inaugural poet in the 2021 inauguration, with her poem, "The Hill We Climb." The poem was written as a call for unity and collaboration, and it emphasized the opportunity that the future holds. Many felt that the poem represented a call that would remain relevant beyond the inauguration. Gorman wrote her poem on the eve of the storming and occupation of the US Capital on January 6th. It seems a fitting piece to share today as we have witnessed protests and demonstrations at our own Parliament Hill.

When day comes, we ask ourselves, where can we find light in this never-ending shade?

The loss we carry. A sea we must wade.

We braved the belly of the beast.

We've learned that quiet isn't always peace, and the norms and notions of what "just" is isn't always justice.

And yet the dawn is ours before we knew it.

Somehow we do it.

Somehow we weathered and witnessed a nation that isn't broken, but simply unfinished.

We, the successors of a country and a time where a skinny Black girl descended from slaves and raised by a single mother can dream of becoming president, only to find herself reciting for one.

And, yes, we are far from polished, far from pristine, but that doesn't mean we are striving to form a union that is perfect.

We are striving to forge our union with purpose.

To compose a country committed to all cultures, colors, characters and conditions of man.

And so we lift our gaze, not to what stands between us, but what stands before us.

We close the divide because we know to put our future first, we must first put our differences aside.

We lay down our arms so we can reach out our arms to one another.

We seek harm to none and harmony for all.

Let the globe, if nothing else, say this is true.

That even as we grieved, we grew.

That even as we hurt, we hoped.

That even as we tired, we tried.

That we'll forever be tied together, victorious.

Not because we will never again know defeat, but because we will never again sow division.

Scripture tells us to envision that everyone shall sit under their own vine and fig tree, and no one shall make them afraid.

If we're to live up to our own time, then victory won't lie in the blade, but in all the bridges we've made.

That is the promise to glade, the hill we climb, if only we dare.

It's because being American is more than a pride we inherit.

It's the past we step into and how we repair it.

We've seen a force that would shatter our nation, rather than share it.

Would destroy our country if it meant delaying democracy.

And this effort very nearly succeeded.

But while democracy can be periodically delayed, it can never be permanently defeated.

In this truth, in this faith we trust, for while we have our eyes on the future, history has its eyes on us.

This is the era of just redemption.

We feared at its inception.

We did not feel prepared to be the heirs of such a terrifying hour.

But within it we found the power to author a new chapter, to offer hope and laughter to ourselves.

So, while once we asked, how could we possibly prevail over catastrophe, now we assert, how could catastrophe possibly prevail over us?

We will not march back to what was, but move to what shall be: a country that is bruised but whole, benevolent but bold, fierce and free.

We will not be turned around or interrupted by intimidation because we know our inaction and inertia will be the inheritance of the next generation, become the future.

Our blunders become their burdens.

But one thing is certain.

If we merge mercy with might, and might with right, then love becomes our legacy and change our children's birthright.

So let us leave behind a country better than the one we were left.

Every breath from my bronze-pounded chest, we will raise this wounded world into a wondrous one.

We will rise from the golden hills of the West.

We will rise from the windswept Northeast where our forefathers first realized revolution.

We will rise from the lake-rimmed cities of the Midwestern states.

We will rise from the sun-baked South.

We will rebuild, reconcile, and recover.

And every known nook of our nation and every corner called our country, our people diverse and beautiful, will emerge battered and beautiful.

When day comes, we step out of the shade of flame and unafraid.

The new dawn balloons as we free it.

For there is always light, if only we're brave enough to see it.

Update from Grace Official Board



At the board meeting this week, two decisions were made about re-opening Grace United Church. As of March 1st, the building will be open to meetings and gatherings for up to 50 people. In -person services will commence Sunday, March 6th. Masking is still required. All our decisions are based upon guidance from South West Public Health and the government of Ontario.

Because of these many quickly changing protocols, the planned survey to our community of faith will be delayed. We value your input and thoughts and if you wish to discuss this further, please be in touch with either Rev Gail or myself.

Camp Bimini will be celebrating 75 years of ministry with youth and children this year. As a cabin sponsor we have some responsibilities for the cabin, including spring cleaning each year, ensuring curtains and windows are present and in good condition and ensuring that the interior is painted regularly. Most of the cabins are in need of a fresh coat of paint outside as well but this large task happens only about every ten years.

At the January board meeting, a motion was passed that Grace commits to fundraising with the youth group to cover the cost of paint and to provide labour to help with the painting. As you will understand the timeline for this to happen is dependent on our spring weather. We expressed our gratitude to Bimini for giving us lots of time to organize fundraising events and find folk for the 2-3 days of work by 2-3 people with 2-3 gallons of paint recommended by Bimini. The outside task will likely require 1-2 days of scraping and painting and the probable cost for paint will be about \$750. I know that to several members, like myself, Bimini is a very special and wonderful place that provides peace and comfort, a safe place for youth and children to experience spiritual learning and growth and a special spot to hold church services and meetings. I have confidence that you will willingly help with the fundraising and work asked of our community of faith as Bimini celebrates the continuing vision of a few folk many years ago. Our fun fundraiser will take place during Lent and information for your participation will be sent soon.
