The Totem Pole at St. John's Anglican Church in Old Massett (by Paul Bartlett)

June is National Indigenous History month. Earlier this month, Joan and I experienced the very rich history and culture of the Haida First Nations people when we visited Haida Gwaii (as the Queen Charlotte Islands in BC are now called). Although very evident today, the Haida culture had at one time almost vanished.

Robert Davidson, a native of Old Massett, was attending school in Vancouver in 1965. It was there, far away from home, in a museum, that he discovered the greatness of his native Haida heritage. There were beautiful bowls, ladles, boxes, masks and paddles as well as totem poles—all carved from wood—that impressed him so much that he decided to become an artist. As a first step, at age nineteen, he apprenticed with the well-known carver Bill Reid.



Back home in Old Massett, Davidson felt a deep sorrow for his elders. He felt his people were out of touch with their once rich and flourishing artistic culture. The Haida culture had been systematically obliterated by church and state. Their totem poles had been deemed sinful pagan idols and were taken down and transported to museums around the world. Davidson "felt driven" to carve a totem pole for his elders to awaken some pride.

In 1969 at age twenty-two, Davidson finished his carving of a 40 ft traditional Haida pole. A large crowd witnessed the raising of the pole and celebrated with a potlatch feast. As it was being raised, spontaneous singing and dancing of long dormant songs occurred. Davidson's pole was the first totem pole to be raised in the Queen Charlotte Islands in over 100 years and it marked a turning point in pride on the islands. This pole sparked a rebuilding of Haida culture and nationhood that continues today.

The pole is meant to illustrate the Bear Mother story of Haida lore. On the pole are three bear crests integrated with several small humans and Frog, and is topped by three high-hatted "watchmen". This story explains why, whenever a bear is killed for its meat and hide, a special song of mourning is always sung. It encourages respect for the natural world and an understanding that we share this planet with other species who have rights.

Davidson's totem pole was raised on the site of the Anglican Church in Old Massett and I have been trying to find out why, of all the places in the village it could have been located, it was put in front of the church.



Robertson himself has said, "This totem pole was actually a catalyst, to make a statement, 'Hey! We're alive and we want to be part of this world!'"

I hope the pole was placed in front of the church to show that we and our indigenous friends share the same values. A plaque in a nearby forest reads, "I am nature and a lesson of the Haida culture. Look after each other and be generous. Never take more than you need. Enjoy, share and respect the lands and waters that sustain you. Everything I have has a purpose. Look after me and I in turn will always look after you."

Much work has been done by many folk as we move forward without Rev. Gail and we would like to thank everyone who has participated in that process. The summer services have been arranged by the Worship Committee and emergency pastoral care for June and July will be done by Rev. Maggie Dieter, who has also been named by Western Ontario Waterways as our pastoral charge supervisor while we are without a minister. Our Ministry and Personnel Committee created a position description for a supply minister which was approved by the Official Board. In order to have access to a larger pool of Ministry Personnel from which to choose, the decision was made to ask for half time supply from the lists of Ordained, Diaconal and Licensed Lay Worship Leaders. These folk are generally retired or wish only part-time work. We realize that this choice may require our community of faith to be responsible for some tasks that previously were done by our minister. The contract for a supply minister is six months, renewable two more times, so could last as long as a year and a half. During the time we have a supply minister, we will be busy discerning who we are as a community of faith and what we require in a full time minister. We anticipate honest and thoughtful discussion from all members of Grace as documents are updated to reflect who we are as we move forward. WOW Regional Council has received the requested documents of job position description and financial viability information and will appoint a liaison to work with a committee of Dale Brenneman, Dale Ruby and myself to help fill the supply position. You will be kept up-to-date as we move along through this process.
