#### Fourth Sunday in Lent Taking a Risk

Then Joshua son of Nun sent two men secretly from Shittim as spies, saying, "Go, view the land, especially Jericho." So they went and entered the house of a prostitute whose name was Rahab and spent the night there . . . As soon as we heard it, our hearts melted, and there was no courage left in any of us because of you. The Lord your God is indeed God in heaven above and on earth below.

Joshua 2:1, 11

#### Prepare

I love how often in the First Testament God uses people other than the children of Israel to teach profound truths and to help enact the will of God. It is amazing to me in the these ancient stories how the faith of some influences others to be courageous. Rahab, an inhabitant of the soon-to-be conquered Jericho, risks her life and those of her family in order to hide Joshua's spies. She has heard the stories of what the Israelite God has done in other lands, and at first is terrified, but then realizes that their God is powerful and to be exalted. Because of her courage, Joshua's men have renewed hope that they will prevail in the quest God has sent them on. She takes a huge risk to save their lives. They take a huge risk in trusting her to save them! Sometimes we despair in our own tradition that we are not doing enough. Sometimes we witness so much brokenness in the world that we lose hope. But there are always people who are taking risks and exercising courage—so that there will always be life, love, joy and hope. So many people of all kinds of faith traditions (and from outside them) take huge risks to ensure that there will be another tomorrow, and that there will be abundant life for us all. Through the courageous actions of countless people all around the world, and throughout time, the hope of God for all creation is enacted and expanded. We are not always asked to take life-changing risks as we walk the path of Jesus. But each time we step out to live by the rule of love, to celebrate diversity, to choose justice, to care for one another, it takes courage. Courage to step outside what is popular and the norm. Each time we exercise that courage—no matter how large or small—we produce more hope and inspire others to hope as well.

#### Ponder

What can we learn from the courage of others who are working for peace, justice, and wholeness in the world? How do others outside of your faith (or any faith) live courageously? How is God working in and through all kinds of people to bring more love, hope, justice, and peace to the world?

#### Prayer

God, sometimes I turn away when you call me to courageous action. Sometimes I close the door when I am prompted to take a risk in order for your justice to be enacted. Sometimes I turn away from opportunities to be your love-lived in the world. Forgive me when this side of my humanity comes out on top. Inspire me to care for your people, your creation, your world, as you do. Strengthen my resolve, and the hearts of all who call you Friend . . . so that we together might live in and inspire hope in our world. Thank you for always inviting me to try again and for your faithfulness. Amen.

#### Practice

Compare stories of courage from other traditions (taking particular care to look outside of the Turtle Island context—to other parts of the world and other faith traditions). Look for stories not about 'heroes' but about how other cultures understand the concept of courage. Jen Boyes-Garbin



Look for sign up for volunteers some time in April.



Saint Patrick (born Maewyn Succat) was born in 387 AD in Britain and was kidnapped at the age of 16 by pirates and sold into slavery. During his six year captivity, he found

strength in his religious faith. He dreamed of having seen God. Legend says, he was then dictated by God to escape with a getaway ship. Finally he did escape and went back to Britain and then to onto France. There he joined a monastery and studied under St. Germain, the bishop of Auxerre. He spent approximately 12 years in training. When he became a bishop, he dreamed that the Irish were calling him to Ireland to spread the Christian word there. He used the shamrock, which resembles a three leafed clover, as a metaphor to explain the concept of the Trinity--three strong leaves being together to form one leaf. According to Irish legend, St. Patrick drove all the snakes out of Ireland--that they all went into the sea and drowned. The snake was a revered pagan symbol, and perhaps this was a figurative tale alluding to the fact that he drove paganism out of Ireland. St. Patrick died on March 17, 462 AD




"I will give thanks to you, Lord, with all my heart; I will tell of all your wonderful deeds." (Psalm 9:1)
