Easter Sunday we are seeds

"Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?" The sting of death is sin, and the power he gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Corinthians 15:55-57



#### Prepare

So many of us are afraid of death. Perhaps because our origin story is a bit

scary. We have ended up interpreting the story of the beginning in Genesis as God creating life out of nothing. Genesis 1:2 says, "The earth was a formless void." Well, if the beginning was a formless void, the end is the return to that formless void. Even though we have also believed that God is in heaven and we will go live with God forever, sometimes that promise doesn't seem to appease our fear of death. The formless void haunts us.

We have also learned that history is linear, with one beginning and one end. Our eschaton, our hope, is in the future. There is very little to do here before our death. I wonder if we might start to lose the fear of death if we remember two things.

First, the Psalmist reminds us this: "I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:14). Our beginning is made of awe and wonder; to die is to go back to that same awe and wonder of God. If God made us out of mud, the mud is glorious and filled with God's presence.

The second thing is to think that perhaps there is no death, but life replenishing itself time and again. Death is a passage into another form of living, in God. We will not disappear but live again in God's vastness. We are dust and to dust we shall return. And if we are to return to God's wonder, the soil, the mud, and the dust mean that we become organic life again. Our bodies will resurrect and will become other forms of life for the glory of God. Until God takes us to heaven.

In that way, death has no victory, for Jesus has conquered it all. In Jesus we keep on resurrecting as seeds in the soil. As a well-known phrase says: "They buried us, but they didn't know we were seeds."

When we die, we will live again! For God has made us with the gift of the land! We were mud that turned into seeds that sprout in glorious forms of living! When we die we go back to become seeds again. May we step on this Earth gently, for it is God's gift to us! O death, where is your victory?

#### Ponder

Can we stop thinking of life and death as one event and see life and death as a cyclical movement, just as Earth itself lives?

#### Pray

God of life and death, we are grateful for resurrection! Help us see life as a seed that dies and lives again in your glory. May we trust in you so much that we come to realize that our death and our living is fully in you. Amen.

## Practice

Look around and make a list of resurrections that happen with the cycle of life. Step outside of your house and go where there is soil. Or grab a potted plant. Place your hands on the ground or inside of the pot and say: "The Earth is holding me. God is holding me. I am fine. I shall not fear." Written by Claudio Carvalhaes

### Transcript of video message

"I have seen the Lord." This is what Mary Magdalene says to the disciples on the morning of Christ's resurrection. In another account: "Do not be afraid," Jesus says to the women, "Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; that is where they will see me."

Jesus Christ is risen this Easter morn, hallelujah! Alléluia!

Later, Paul tells the church in Colossae, "So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth..."

My grandmother once told me, when I was particularly strident about a social justice issue: "I certainly hope you have not forgotten the resurrection, and that we are an Easter people. We believe in hope."

I sighed in exasperation as young people can do, I think I rolled my eyes, and I said: "No, Grandma, I won't forget that we are an Easter people."

And I don't.

Michael Shewburg said to me earlier this year: "The church restructured, and then the pandemic came and the world restructured."

Sometimes, it can feel as if this world is shifting under our feet—or maybe, more accurately, we are adrift at sea, sometimes getting tumbled in the waves and not knowing which way is up. But we have moments when we can break through to the surface, and we see the horizon.

It is important in this circumstance, for our survival, to look always to the horizon.

One of my favourite writers, a futurist and game designer named Jane McGonigal, talks about the importance of looking to the horizon—or what she calls "future episodic thinking." When you can imagine both the worst that could happen, and the best future you'd want to see, you put in place the building blocks to manage either. If you've imagined the worst that could happen, you are able to think through how you respond. But if you imagine what you would like to have happen, say, 10 years into the future, you can live into that hope, and put the building blocks into place and work towards that future vision.

And this is what we are about as the church at Easter. The reality is that Jesus was crucified and died the worst happened. But we are reminded each year at Easter that death did not overcome life. With images of dawn breaking on the horizon, let us listen to Paul's words to the Colossians and set our minds to that radical hope that is the Easter promise. In that hope, what can we imagine together: towards right reconciliation? for world peace? for economic justice? for climate justice? for the rural church? for the future of our denomination? Let's imagine all of our hopes for a just and peace world together, practising deep spirituality, bold discipleship, and daring justice.
