For Anniversary Sunday at Grace United Church, Some Early History

Here's a question for you. Of the various congregations that came together 54 years ago to form Grace United Church, in which one did the very earliest members of our church first gather to worship? Was it at Lingelbach? At South Easthope? At Harmony? A significant number of our current membership can trace their faith roots to a small congregation that once existed near Cassel. Here is the story of that East Zorra Evangelical Church taken from chapter one "The Early Years of East Zorra Township" in a booklet entitled *Cassel Mennonite Church* 1935-1985 written by Vernon Zehr and Leona Bender.

"The north-east third of East Zorra Township was first settled by German-speaking immigrants from Germany, Switzerland, and eastern France (Alsace and Lorraine). These German-speaking people staked out their land claims along the dirt roads and were soon hard at work clearing the land with broadaxe and fire. These people became a

cohesive community forged together by a common language and common cultural and racial background. They shared each other's toils and tears, shared the Protestant work ethic, encouraged each other and with dogged determination created one of the most attractive farming communities in Ontario.

"With so much in common, it is surprising that their faith in and worship of the same universal God did not further enhance their togetherness. In fact, the strong religious convictions and denominational loyalties got in the way of complete harmony. Even though these people had so much in common, on Sunday morning they went to churches of three different denominations. Three church buildings in a two mile radius (Lutheran, Amish and Evangelical) stood as evidence of their differences.

"The Evangelicals (or German Methodists as they were called) were the first to erect a place of worship. They built a frame structure in 1858 at the corner of the 17th Concession and the Maplewood sideroad on land donated by the Valentine Grenzebach family. As devout Evangelicals, they stressed personal faith, the need for conversion and repentance, and were very zealous in promoting their faith and calling people into active church work. By the turn of the century, seven ministers had come from this small congregation to serve the broader denomination: two from the Grenzebach family, two from the Haist family, two from the Staebler family, and one by the name of Amacher. Other names from this congregation in the early years were Ankenmann, Lingelbach, Lemox, Hess, Luizler, Kreh, Otto, Pletsch, Spahr, Schlemmer, Reibling, Nicklas, Wagester, and Weil. "The spot where this church building stood was rather wet and unsuitable for a cemetery. A few people were buried there. The markers are now piled in a corner of the lot. □

Another cemetery was soon established two miles south at the corner of the 17th and the Cassel sideroad (on land donated by the Haist family). In 1901, the original frame building was sold to the Lingelbach brothers for \$113 and a new beautiful brick building was erected next to the cemetery. Someone in the church records stated that "it was nice enough to be a city church." The writer records that "Zorra was famous for its good farms and good preachers." The church records were written in excellent German script until 1904. "In 1923, only twenty-two years after its construction, the church was closed. A total of ten different ministers had served the church in those years. Only five families remained as members. Some had moved to urban centres, some had gone to college and seminaries and did not return to the farms their parents had homesteaded."

The members of the East Zorra Evangelical congregation who remained transferred their membership to Zion Evangelical Church in Tavistock. The church remained vacant until 1935 when approximately 30 families from the over-crowded East Zorra Amish Mennonite community rented the vacant building. In September of that year they purchased it for \$800 with the Evangelicals reserving the right to use the building for an annual decoration day service and for their cemetery for funerals.






CHRISTMAS MUSICAL AT GRACE





More Interesting Facts about the East Zorra Evangelical Congregation at Cassel

The Evangelical church was a Protestant denomination that was founded in 1800 by the German-speaking Jacob Albright of Lancaster, Pennsylvania. He was very much influenced by John Wesley and the English Methodist Church. Albright was a passionate and powerful speaker and in his sermons stressed holiness, social activism, and evangelism. His ideas were outlined in his Book of Discipline which was based on a German translation of the English Methodist Book of Discipline. His word spread rapidly through the German communities, often through revival meetings and preachers on horseback, and by 1892 there were over 2000 Evangelical congregations in North America, including those in East Zorra, Lingelbach, South Easthope and Tavistock. In 1946, the Evangelical Association joined with the United Brethren in Christ to form the Evangelical United Brethren

(EUB) and in 1968 the EUB joined with the United Church of Canada (which also had Methodist roots).

The Evangelical congregation in East Zorra began meeting around 1858. In June 1861, Valentine Grenzebach donated 1 acre of his land at Lot 30 on the 17th line to the trustees of the Evangelical Church (listed as Jacob Wagner and Jacob Staebler). On the deed it was stated that the land was for a church site, a meeting house, and a burial site. A frame church was built on the lot.

Three children of Johannes and Anna Grenzebach in Germany emigrated to Canada in 1848: Johannes (John), Anna Marie (Mary) and Valentin (Valentine) Grenzebach. John had originally purchased the 200 acre property at lot 30 Concession 17 in 1848 but he decided to give it up to become an Evangelical preacher and he sold the farm to his brother Valentine in 1855. Valentine stayed on the farm and would have two wives and raise ten children. Donna Rudy is the great-granddaughter of Valentine's son William and she has done a very thorough history of the Grenzebach family tree. Keith Wiffen her cousin is another Grenzebach descendent.

Valentine's sister Mary married William Morlock and they lived next door. William was listed as "class leader" when thirty Evangelicals gathered in Tavistock in 1865 to form a congregation there. That would become Zion Evangelical Church. Mary and William's granddaughter married Rev. William Zimmerman, the grandfather of Tom Zimmerman. The Grenzebach farm would eventually become the family home of the Weicker family, William and Olive (nee Pletsch) and their children Jim, Judy (Zehr) and Joanne (Bean). When Jim moved off the farm because of illness, the Beans acquired ownership of the property. Joanne's son Trent currently lives on the farm.

This spot where the first church building stood was wet and proved rather unsuitable for a cemetery and so both church and cemetery moved one sideroad south to lot 26. The "Old EUB" cemetery is still present, however, and adjoins the property now owned by John and Celia (Shantz) Reiger. Celia has done extensive research on the cemetery. There are 20 grave markers in the cemetery, five on the west side that are of children and 15 on the east side that are adults. The earliest grave is dated 1862, the latest is dated 1875. In 1940, the grave markers/slabs were laid flat and the cemetery was enclosed by a fence. Apparently the cemetery became quite overgrown with grass and weeds and, after much prodding from Jack Wettlaufer, the Township of East Zorra-Tavistock agreed to take care of the cemetery. Trent Bean is the current caretaker.

In 1900, a beautiful new brick church was built by the Evangelical congregation at the corner of the 17th Concession and the Maplewood sideroad to replace the old frame structure. Some of the members of the Evangelical Building Committee at that time were Jacob S. Otto, George Staebler, Henry Schlemmer, Henry Nicklas, and Noah Pletsch. The foundation stone of the new church was laid on 2 August 1900 with the result that the name given to the church was Centennial Evangelical Church.

In the new church, there were four beautiful stained-glass windows installed in memory of the departed heads of the Haist, Pletsch, Schlemmer, and Grenzebach families. After the Mennonites purchased the church in 1935, the stained-glass windows were replaced by frosted glass. "I'm not sure why we got rid of them" wrote one early Mennonite member, "I guess we thought they were too worldly. The square bell turret or tower did not fit our concept of a simple peace meeting church either." The trustees of the Evangelical church whose names were on the bill of sale when it was sold to Cassel Mennonite Church were Aaron Pletsch, Adam Lingelbach, and Allen Otto. One of the requests by the trustees was that they be allowed to use the church once a year for a graves decoration ceremony. The response by the Mennonites on 31 October 1935 was the following: "In regard to Provision I of your offer (building being available for the memorial and grave decoration services of the Evangelical Church), we beg to say that so far as the building is concerned for memorial and graves decoration services, it is at your service on the condition that no musical instruments be used in the church building at such services because our convictions forbid us any but vocal music in divine worship in church."

A program for the grave decoration service in 2002 lists the cemetery board as Lester Weil, Joan (Otto) MacDermid, Mary Lou (Weil) Ross, Henry Ruby, Robert Ferguson, and Sandra Lock. Mary Lou Ross continues as the treasurer of the "New EUB Cemetery". She says the cemetery is a community cemetery, open to everyone. There are people all faiths buried there, including both Evangelicals and Mennonites.
